TALL BEINGS ALLEGEDLY EXTRACTED BLOOD.

A young man named Bernardino Cabrera, aged 34, and generally respected for his honesty, was out of doors on an errand when a powerful reddish light descended on him from above. The time was 0.40am on July 20, 1994. It was a craft, and from it came two "gigantic" beings who took him aboard and laid him on a sort of "stretcher" and drew blood from him.

There was no spoken communication between them, but he says he understood what the beings were saying to him even though they did not move their lips and no sound was heard from them.

They told him that if he wanted to reveal the affair to the public, he could do so. "Some folk would believe him, some would not".

Cabrera was then set down on the main square of

Caleufú, in front of the Police Station. He went at once to the local hospital and was there seen by Dr. Juan Alberto Breppe, the doctor on duty. The doctor gave him a thorough examination after hearing his story, and found nothing wrong or abnormal. Interviewed a few days later by reporters from the media, the doctor stated that he had also found no signs whatever that Cabrera was drunk.

Reporters from the newspaper (*La Arena*) interviewed the Assistant Chief of Police Felipe Exner about the case. Exner confirmed the details of Cabrera's story, as given above, and commented:

"Cabrera is a young fellow, 34 years old — a humble worker, who does not possess much education, but he is not a bum."

MYSTERIOUS "POWER-PLANTS" (?) DISCOVERED IN FAR NORTH-EASTERN SIBERIA

INTRODUCTION BY EDITOR OF UFO-NACHRICHTEN.

Today we present to our readers, in an exclusive and important report, details of some mysterious installations that have been discovered in Yakutia (far north-eastern Siberia). This is not a question of any sort of historical discoveries, but of objects directly connected with mankind and with our very near future. We also publish here for the first time some sketches of the installations, made by hunters. But in the course of the coming year we expect to be able to issue photos of the mysterious things. An expedition to the region is being planned, and a staff member of *UFO-Nachrichten's* editorial board will take part in it.

In the present article, Valeriy Uvarov has used material from various sources, including the Russian newspapers *Trud* and *Anomaliya* and the Moscow association, *Ecology of the Unknown*.

In the far Northeast of Yakutia, in the vicinity of Verkhniy Vilyuisk (63°40N, 121°20E. G.C.) there is an area, highly difficult to reach, which bears the traces of cataclysms of some kind - uprooted trees and shattered rocks lying around in a radius of hundreds of kilometres. From the earliest times this region has been known as

"*The Valley of the Dead*".

The native Yakut tribes themselves avoid this remote region. Legends that have spread from mouth to mouth among the people state that there is also a place there "*where a flattened arch sticks up out of the ground*". Beneath this arch are a number of metallic chambers in which, even when there is severe frost, it is as warm as in summertime.

In the days of old, the local hunters included adventurous spirits who had spent a night in those chambers. Subsequently they became gravely ill. And those of them who had spent *several* successive nights in there very soon died.

Another object described as being there has a regularly curved red rim. This rim is so sharp that one might trim one's fingernails with it. It sticks up so high out of the perma-frost soil that you can ride straight into it on your reindeer (see sketch).

FURTHER DISCOVERIES OF MYSTERIOUS INSTALLATIONS

Already in the 19th century, the well-known explorer of Vilyuisk, R. Maak, reported as follows: "*On the bank of the river Algyj Timirnit which, translated, means approximately 'A big cauldron has come down', there is indeed actually a gigantic copper cauldron or kettle (Kessel in German). Its exact dimensions are not known, as only the rim of it is visible above the ground-*

level. *There are, incidentally, said to be several trees growing on the rim of it.*"

Russian scientists from the town of Mirny, A. Gutenyov and J. Mikhailovskiy, reported about an elderly nomad who had visited the "Valley of the Dead", and who spoke of a "metallic cave in which there lie very thin, black, one-eyed men in metallic clothing".

And here are a few lines from a letter written by a man from Vladivostok, Mikhail Korezkiy, who had also visited the "Valley of the Dead".

"I was in that area three times. The first time, when I was ten years old, was in 1933. My father was at that time looking for work.

"Then, later, I was there again in 1939. And then, finally, in 1949 I was there with a group of young fellows. The so-called "Valley of the Dead" extends along the right bank of the river Vilyui, over a string of valleys and strips of pasture land.

"On all three occasions when I was there, we had a Yakut native accompanying us. We hadn't gone into the area out of a thirst for travel or for adventure, but out of necessity. Because it was possible to wash for gold there without the fear of being robbed or even murdered at the end of the mining season. (Simply because there was nobody else there!)

"As regards the "mystery objects" my guess is that there are quite a lot of them there. I myself saw seven of the "cauldrons" or "kettles" in those days. All were very enigmatic and mysterious. The average radius of them was about 6 to 9 metres. They are made of a metal that is unknown to me. I have heard it said that they were of copper, but I am not certain about that. You cannot break the stuff, and you cannot work it in a forge. If it had been copper my hammer would have left marks on it. But *that* "copper" was covered with a coating of some unknown stuff resembling *emery*. No oxidization coating was detectable, and you could neither scratch it nor cut it.

"We couldn't detect any deep-going shafts or chambers. But I noticed that the plant-growth around the 'cauldrons' was anomalous - that is to say, very luxuriant and twice the height of a man. Our entire party (6 people) spent a night in one of the 'cauldrons'. We felt nothing unpleasant, we were quiet and comfortable in there, and nobody became seriously ill afterwards."

"There was only one of the men - he had all his hair fall out three months later. And I myself got three small wounds, as big as match-heads, on the left side of my head (I slept on that side). I had medication on the three wounds, but today however they still are not healed.

"All our attempts to break off at least very small pieces of one of those remarkable 'cauldrons' were unsuccessful. The only thing I was able to bring away was a *stone*. But no ordinary stone. It was one half of a complete ball some 6cms in diameter. It was black, and it bore no visible traces of having been 'worked'. It was very smooth, as though polished. I had found it in one of the 'cauldrons'. I took this 'Yakutian souvenir' with us to the village of Samarka (Far Eastern Siberia) where my parents were living in 1933. It remained there untouched until my grandmother decided that she wanted

to build a house. It was necessary to put in panes of glass for the windows but there was not a single glass-cutter in the village. So I just chanced to hit on the idea of employing that stone hemisphere and tried to use its edge to cut the glass, and it worked marvellously. And so, after that, all our relatives and friends used it to cut their glass. Then in 1937, I handed the stone over to my grandfather. In the following autumn he was arrested and sent to the slave-labour camp at Magadan, where he died a year later. And so, alas, the stone was lost..."

In that letter, Mikhail Koretzkiy particularly emphasised that in 1933 the Yakutian guide who accompanied him five and ten years previously had also discovered some of the 'cauldrons' there. They were described as round, and sticking up high out of the ground. *And they looked as though new. Later, when he saw them again, they had cracks in them.*

Koretzkiy emphasises that the 'cauldrons' seen twice by him had in the intervening years sunk appreciably into the ground. Yakut tribal legends contain recollections of explosions, fiery tornadoes, and balls flying up into the air. And all these phenomena are in some way or other connected with the mysterious metallic constructions in the "Valley of Death".

Some of them were great round "metallic houses" standing on many side-struts. They had possessed neither windows nor doors, but merely a spacious stairway on the dome (see illustration). Some of these constructions have now almost totally sunk into the perma-frost ground, so that on the surface all that is now visible is the curvature, like a vault. *Various eyewitnesses — unknown to each other — who have seen these "thundering metallic houses" - are in total agreement as to their descriptions.*

Other objects that have been seen there looked like great metallic hemispheres scattered about all over the place. Nobody knows how these "thundering steel lids" were closed.

The Yakutian legends say that mysterious glowing balls came out of an aperture "spewing fire and smoke." From the same source there came also the "fiery tornadoes", which, from the descriptions, sound very much like modern atomic explosions.

Before each explosion or each series of explosions, say the legends, a fiery ball flew at top speed out of the iron opening and went up into the sky, like a thin column of flame — without doing any damage. An interesting question would be this — *was it always from the same "opening", or were there several of them?*

Then, say the legends, at the top of the pillar of fire there came a big "fireball". Then there would be four thunderclaps every time, until the "fireball" vanished, leaving behind it a long trail of smoke.

After that, away in the distance, you would hear a whole cannonade of explosions.

It is an actual fact that, in February, 1984, in the region of the River Tschon, several fishermen saw two enormous flying globes coming sailing over the hills from the north. Gathering speed, the globes then shot right up vertically, and vanished into the clouds. Probably such

sights were well known and seen in the days of old, and had been fused into the legends.

Also in 1984 (on February 26) a fireball was seen at a height of about 100 kms. in the sky over both Western and Eastern Siberia, and following precisely the same trajectory as the Tunguska object in 1908. Without touching the Earth, the fireball of February 1984 exploded over the area of the river Tschulym.

[*Note by Editor of FSR.* Is there any need to emphasise that this vast desolate, and well-nigh uninhabited region does contain the very area where the mysterious Tunguska explosion of 1908 occurred! The entire region is of immense interest to Russian scientists because, in respect of both flora and fauna and also of its very *geology*, it includes features and species of apparently enormous antiquity, and it may be that *geologically it is one of the oldest areas of the Earth's surface now above water and, indeed, may never have been submerged at all.* Some years ago, in one of his books on the Loch Ness Monsters and other unknown marine and lake creatures, my friend the British researcher Tim Dinsdale published my translations of articles from *PRIRODA* (the Russian scientific equivalent of Britain's *NATURE*) about recent close sightings of several unknown lake monsters, including one that is *identical* with our "Nessie."

These reports came from a lake on the Omonoyakan Plateau, right in the middle of this vast frozen region which is probably now the least known and least explored part of the Earth. Incidentally our Planet's coldest spot, its "cold Pole", is not at either the North or the South Pole, but is right here, in the Arctic Circle, at a place called Verkhoyansk. G.C.]

And when we peer back into the legends of Yakutia, we obtain knowledge of similar explosions and similar happenings. They agree to an astounding degree with what was reported both by the eyewitnesses of the Tunguska Explosion and of the flying object over the Tschulym River on February 26, 1984. "It shot with a noise like thunder straight up into the sky, with a blue fiery trail behind it followed by by roaring white fire and

red sparks. And the clouds were all lit up with reflected fire."

Incidentally, be it noted that the *direction* was also given, namely "over the rim of the yellow western sky" — that is to say, in exactly the same direction as was followed by the Tunguska flying body (1908) and the Tschulym River flying body (1984)

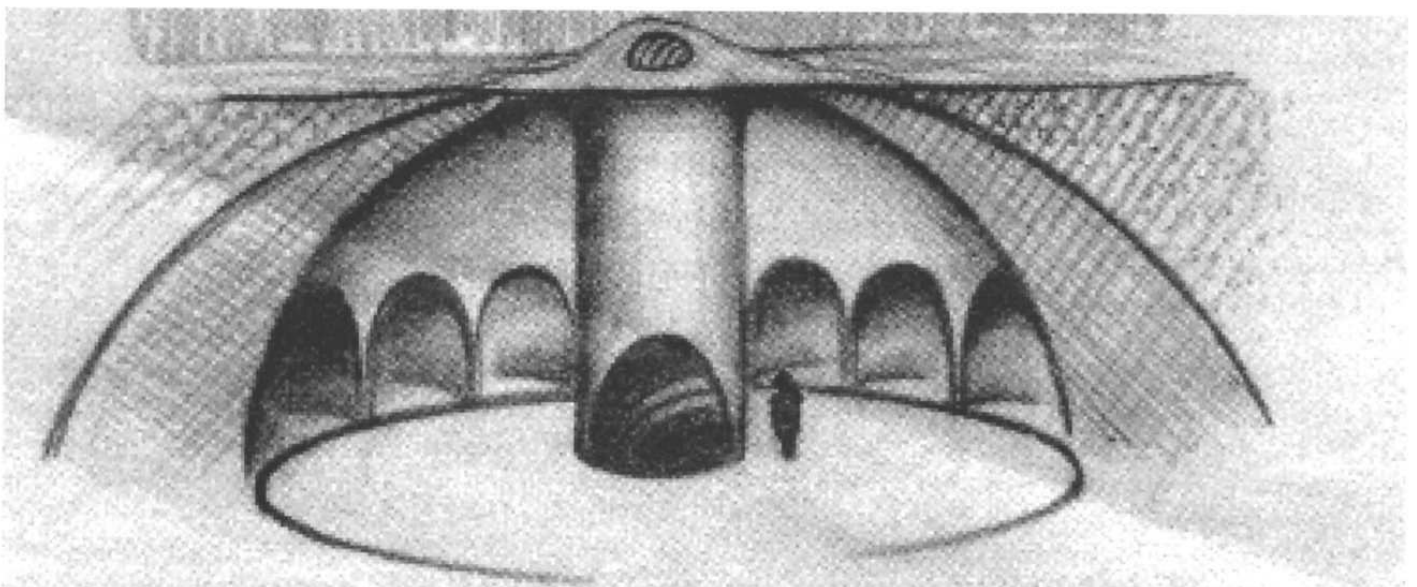
But how then could it have come about that it was precisely in this very same region that legends with such content could have sprung up? What is this "opening with a roaring steel cover out of which fiery balls came flying"? *In story and legend this region is known as the Valley of the Dead because the explosions destroyed everything round about over a radius of hundreds of kilometres.*

When a study of the *place-names* in the Verkhniy Vilyuisk area was being carried out, the original sounds and consequently the basic meanings of the place-names in the native languages were reconstructed, and it was found that the most important of the place-names coincided totally with the contents of the legends. This consequently means that the events described in the legends relate precisely to the Verkhniy Vilyuisk region. The marks and signs left in the region also point to that.

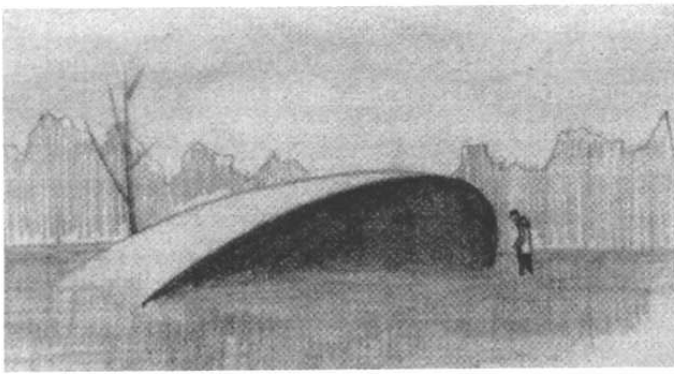
So what, then, are the remarkable "cauldrons" hidden in the soil of Yakutia? Are they parts of "flying saucers", as many Ufologists maintain? Or are they relic traces of another, age-old, civilization?

Gutenjov and J Mikhailovskiy assume that these constructions in the Vilyuisk region were a kind of age-old anti-asteroid defence, built either by Extraterrestrials or by some vanished ancient terrestrial civilization. These experts are of the opinion that these defence constructions are not working properly and are now, with their uncontrolled energy output, a danger to the indigenous population.

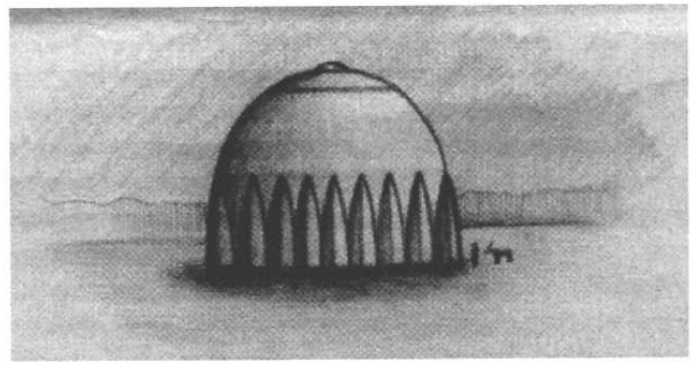

REPORTED DISCOVERY OF ALIEN (?) CORPSE IN PUERTO RICO. (PART I)

Eighteen months ago, during a lecture that I was giving at the Universidad Metropolitana (University at Cupey, Puerto Rico) a young fellow handed me four photographs which, I admit, impressed me. They showed what seemed to be a strange corpse, obviously of a creature that had been dead for some time.

Intrigued, I asked him about the source of the photos, for they put me somewhat in mind of the "little Greys". The eye-sockets were similar, though sunken. There was almost no nose and the mouth had no lips or visible teeth. The hands had only four fingers, with membranes between them, and ending in pointed nails.

He said he had been given the photos by someone whom I knew, and he let me have copies of them, and thereupon I started my investigation.

I contacted the person who had given him the photos and that person told me an incredible story.

He said the photos were of an alleged alien being whom a member of his family had killed. This relative of his was a cattle-breeder in the north of the Island, who, around 1980-81, had lost a lot of cattle in a very strange way, seemingly mutilated in an indescribable fashion. (There have in fact been **many** such mysterious mutilations of cattle and other animals every year since 1975). He and two friends decided to keep watch, armed with 30/30 rifles, and one night they saw four very strange small creatures appear out of a ravine on the farm and go into a cowshed and bring out a small calf, **floating it in the air. The calf was rigid and was levitating between and slightly above the heads of the four creatures, which swayed and wobbled as they walked.**

The farmer fired several shots and hit one of them, which fell to the ground emitting extraordinary squeals. Simultaneously the calf also fell and the other three creatures started trying to help the wounded one as it lay
